Lecturers:



Terje Søviknes, Mayor of Os Municipality since 1999



Atle Ove Martinussen is a historian and has for many years been working with safeguarding and pursuing of craft traditions in Norwegian Craft Development. He has written many articles about craft and technology. Martinussen is now Director at Museumsenteret in Hordaland. He has been a board member and chairman of Oselvarverkstaden, and is now President of the Professional Committee of the boatyard.



Åsmund Lien has since the workshop was established 16 years ago been the manager of the foundation Oselvarverkstaden. He has for a long periode been a member of the Board of Hordamuseet, and has taken part in the planning of The Boat Hall at the museum and the boat exhibition that opened this spring.



Arne Emil Christensen is Professor Emeritus in Nordic archeology at the University of Oslo. From 1990 to 2006 he was the manager of The Viking Ship Museum at Bygdøy, Oslo. He is one of the pioneers within the Norwegian marine archeology, and has published many articles about boats and boat building. Christensen has been on the Board and the Professional Committee of Oselvarverkstaden since it was established.



Harald Dalland is a boat builder, now retired. He was employed by Oselvarverkstaden from the beginning as the most important tradition carrier when it comes to knowledge of the construction of Oselvar boats. Dalland has since Oselvarverkstaden was established been a member of the Board and the Professional Committee for the workshop. He has given lectures at home and abroad about traditional small boat construction.



Eivind Falk is Director of the Center for Intangible Cultural Heritage, Norwegian Craft Development, Maihaugen



Ole Mikal Olsen Ramsøy is an archaeologist and has for many years been a curator at Hordamuseet. He has played a key role in the development of the Boat Hall and the exhibition there.

Hanus Jensen. Boat builder, Faroe Islands. For many years he has been engaged as a boat builder at The Viking Ship Museum in Roskilde.



Jon Bojer Godal is known for his interpretation of action borne knowledge. He has worked on the use of wood in houses and boats, and on the construction and use of traditional wooden boats. Godal has been employed by the Norwegian Craft Development, and is now linked to the Norwegian Geitbåtmuseum at Nordmøre. The main work is four volumes of The Åfjord Boat and the Nordland Boat, which he wrote together with Gunnar Eldjarn.
